

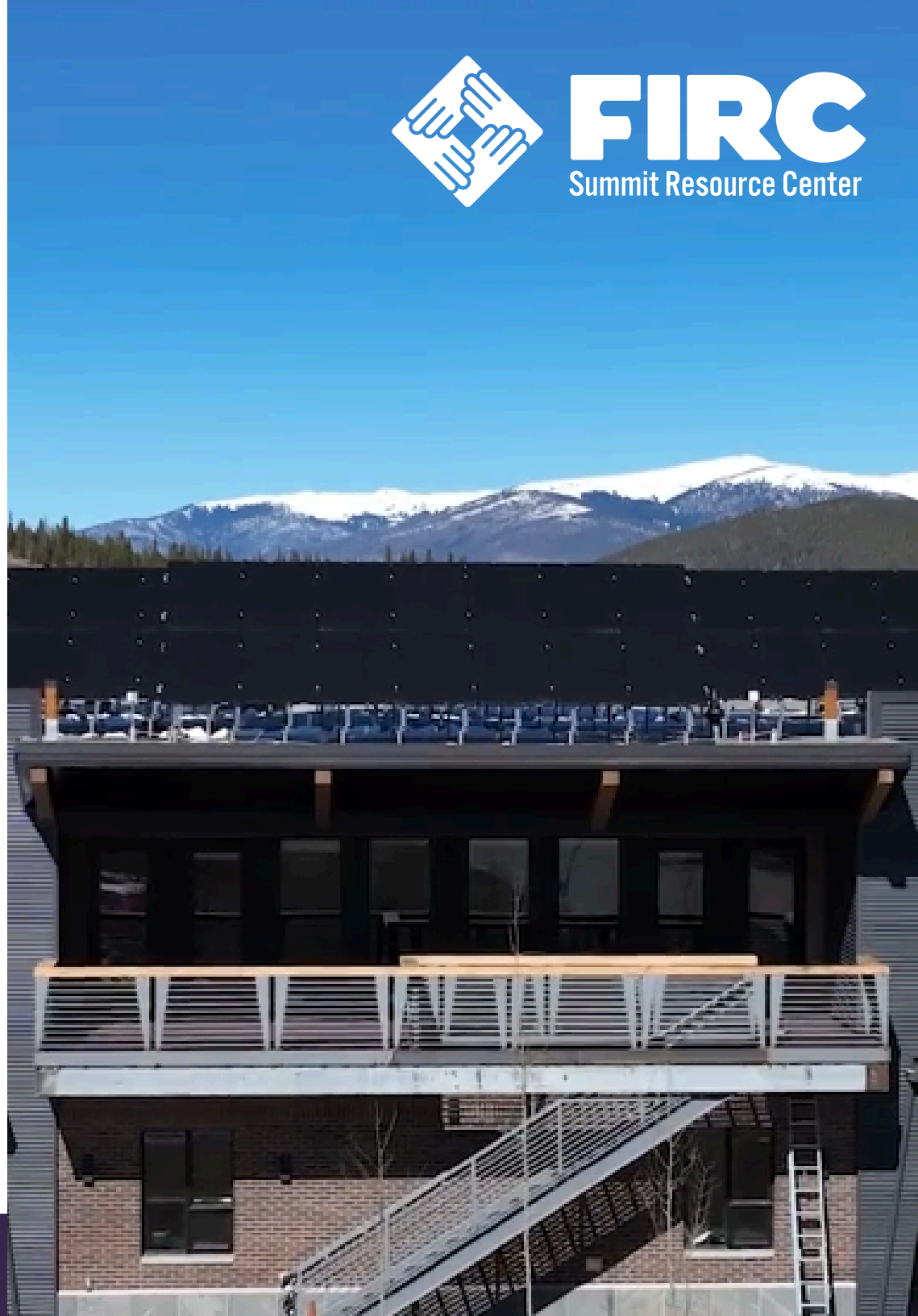

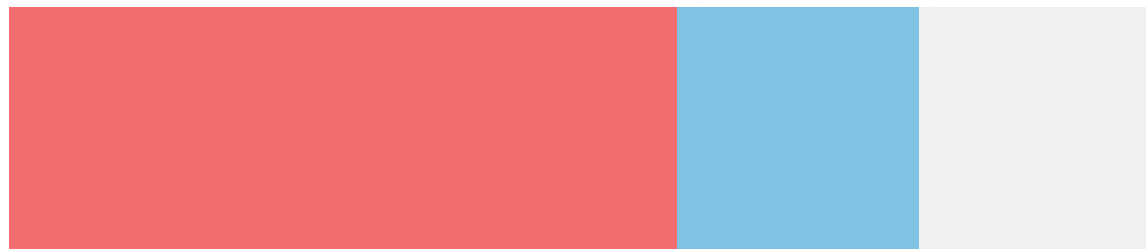


PRIMARY LANGUAGE

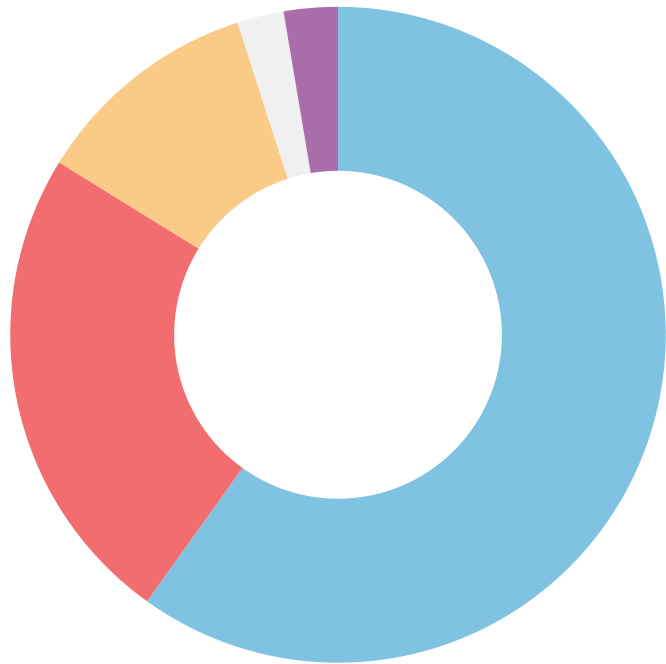
